AN ACT

CREATING THE BAWAT PAMILYA MAY COLLEGE GRADWEYT PROGRAM, AMENDING FOR THE PURPOSE REPUBLIC ACT NO. 10931, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS THE "UNIVERSAL ACCESS TO QUALITY TERTIARY EDUCATION ACT", AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR

EXPLANATORY NOTE

Under the 1987 Constitution, it is the responsibility of the State to protect and promote the right of all citizens to quality education at all levels and to take appropriate steps to make such education accessible to all.

Prior to the passage of Republic Act No. 10931 or the "Universal Access to Quality Tertiary Education Act," only two out of five high school graduates in the country are able to pursue college education. However, even with the passage of said Act, socio-economic concerns still prevent students from low-income families from pursuing and/or completing tertiary education. The COVID-19 pandemic and the shift to online learning has further exacerbated these concerns and prevented thousands of students from continuing or pursuing their college education.

In 2017, data from the Philippine Statistics Authority's (PSA) Annual Poverty Indicators Survey¹ shows that about nine percent or 3.6 million of the estimated 39.2 million Filipinos aged 6 to 24 years old were out-ot-school children and youth (OSCY). OSCYs refer to family member aged 6 to 14 years old who are not attending formal school, and family members aged 15 to 24 years old who are out of school, not gainfully employed, and have not finished college or post-secondary course.

Of the 3.6 million OSCYs in 2017, 83.1 % were 16 to 24 years old – the age at which young Filipinos should be pursuing tertiary education or working. About half of the OSCYs belong to families whose income fall at the bottom 30 percent based on their per capita income. Considering the educational interruptions and impacts on employment

brought about by the pandemic, the plight of OSCYs may have worsened in the last two years.

This proposed measure seeks to deliver on the Constitutional obligation of the State to protect and promote the rights of Filipino students to quality education, especially those from the poorest and most vulnerable families. To this end, this measure creates the *Bawat Pamilya May College Gradweyt* Program, which shall ensure that at least one (1) member of every eligible Filipino family shall be accorded the full support of the State to pursue and successfully complete college education.

The beneficiaries of this Program shall be entitled to receive full tuition and other school fees subsidies and other allowances, as provided in Sections 4 and 7 of the "Universal Access to Quality Tertiary Education Act." Priority shall be given to first generation college students, students who are part of households included in the Department of Social Welfare and Development's *Listahanan* 2.0, and students who are not part of the *Listahanan* 2.0 but belong to low-income households.

In view of the foregoing, the passage of this bill is earnestly sought.

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Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

SECTION 1. Short Title. - This Act shall be known as the "Bawat Panulya May College
 Gradweyt Act".

SEC. 2. Declaration of Policy. – It is hereby declared the policy of the State to protect
and promote the rights of all students to quality education at all levels. The State shall
likewise ensure that students from eligible Filipino families, especially the poorest and
most vulnerable, shall be given utmost priority and adequate support to successfully

pursue and complete tertiary education.

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SEC. 3. "Bawat Pamilya May College Gradweyt Program." – A new Section 8 shall be inserted after Section 7 of Republic Act No. 10931 which shall read as follows:

"SEC. 8. BAWAT PAMILYA MAY COLLEGE GRADWEYT
PROGRAM. - RELATIVE TO THE IMPLEMENTATION OF
SECTION 4 ON FREE HIGHER EDUCATION IN SUCS AND
LUCS AND SECTION 7 ON TERTIARY EDUCATION SUBSIDY
(TES) FOR FILIPINO STUDENTS OF THIS ACT, THERE IS
HEREBY CREATED A BAWAT PAMILYA MAY COLLEGE
GRADUATE PROGRAM TO BE IMPLEMENTED BY THE

| 21 | SEC. 4. Sections 8 to 12 of Republic Act No. 10931 are hereby renumbered |
| 22 | accordingly. |
| 23 | SEC. 5. Section 13 of Republic Act No. 10931 is hereby amended and renumbered |
| 24 | to read as follows: |

| 13 | SEC. 6. The succeeding sections of Republic Act No. 10931 are hereby renumbered |
| 14 | accordingly. |
| 15 | SEC. 7. Appropriations The amount necessary for the effective implementation |
| 16 | of this Act shall be included in the General Appropriations Act. |
| 17 | SEC. 8. Reportorial Requirement The UniFAST Board shall submit an annual |
| 18 | report to the Joint Congressional Oversight Committee on Universal Access to Tertiary |
| 19 | Education of all acts performed pursuant to this Act, particularly on the status of |
| 20 | implementation, targets and actual accomplishments, and other relevant data and |
| 21 | information. |
| 22 | SEC. 9. Implementing Rules and Regulations Within ninety (90) days from the |
| 23 | date of effectivity of this Act, the UniFAST Board, in consultation with relevant |
| 24 | stakeholders, shall promulgate the implementing rules and regulations necessary to |
| 25 | ensure the efficient and effective implementation of this Act. |

- SEC. 10. Separability Clause. If any provision of this Act is declared invalid or
- 2 unconstitutional, the other provisions not affected by such declaration shall remain in full
- 3 force and effect.
- 4 SEC. 11. Repealing Clause. All laws, executive and administrative orders, rules,
- 5 and regulations inconsistent with the foregoing provisions are hereby repealed or
- 6 modified accordingly.
- 7 SEC. 12. Effectivity. This Act shall take effect fitteen (15) days after its publication
- 8 in the Official Gazette or in a newspaper of general circulation in the Philippines.
