AN ACT ESTABLISHING THE PHILIPPINE NATIONAL POLICE UNDER THE ADMINISTRATION AND CONTROL OF THE NATIONAL POLICE COMMISSION

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

SECTION 1. Title of Act. — This Act may be cited as the "Philippine National Police Act of 1989."

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SEC. 2. Declaration of Policy. — It is hereby declared to be the policy and purpose of this Act to achieve and attain a highly efficient and effective police force which shall be civilian in character and national in scope as well as to integrate all functions relating to law enforcement, maintenance of peace and order, and public safety. It is also the objective of this Act to establish an apolitical system of coordination and cooperation between local executives and the Philippine National Police (PNP) in order that

peace and order and public safety may be more effectively 1 attained and enhanced. 2 The police shall be a civilian entity. It shall be or-3 ganized, trained and equipped primarily for the performance of police functions. Its civilian character and national scope 5 shall be paramount. No element of the police force shall be 6 military nor shall any position thereof be occupied by active 7 members of the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP). 8 CHAPTER I 9 THE NATIONAL POLICE COMMISSION 10 SEC. 3. Creation of a National Police Commission. -11 A National Police Commission, hereinafter referred to as 12 the Commission, is hereby created and organized structurally 13 and functionally, for the purpose of effectively discharging 14 the functions prescribed in the Constitution. The Commis-15 sion shall be a collegial body under the President. 16 The present National Police Commission (NAPOLCOM) 17 shall be reconstituted into the Commission established 18 under this Act. Its personnel, properties, equipment, funds, 19 other assets, and liabilities are hereby transferred to and 20 absorbed, to the extent necessary and feasible, by the new 21 Commission and/or PNP. 22 SEC. 4. Powers and Functions of the Commission. -23 The Commission shall administer and control the PNP pur-24 suant to Section 6, Article XVI of the Constitution. Subject 25

- SEC. 5. Composition of the Commission. The Com-12 mission shall consist of the Chairman and four (4) Com-13 missioners, one of whom shall be a fire service protection 14 official or expert, and all of whom shall be appointed by the 15 16 President with the consent of the Commission on Appointments. Of the first appointees, the Chairman shall serve 17 18 for six (6) years, two (2) Commissioners for four (4) years. 19 and the two (2) other Commissioners for two (2) years. 20 without reappointment. All subsequent appointments shall 21 be for a period of six (6) years each, without reappointment. 22 Appointment to any vacancy shall only be for the unex-23 pired portion of the term of the predecessor: Provided, 24 That any person who shall be appointed in this case shall 25 be eligible for regular appointment.

(1) The Planning Service shall provide technical service to the Commission in areas of overall policy formulation, strategic and operational planning, management systems or procedures, and the evaluation and monitoring of the Commission's programs, projects and internal operations;

- (2) The Personnel Management service shall provide the Commission with services relating to manpower, career planning and development, personnel transactions and employee welfare, including the administration of PNP licensure examinations, and the formulation and imple-mentation of guidelines and rules and regulations per-taining to the merit and promotion system for all the members of the PNP as well as the administration of disability, hospitalization, retirement and death benefits as authorized under existing laws;
 - (3) The Administrative Service shall provide the necessary services relating to records, correspondence, supplies, property and equipment, security and general services, and the maintenance, installation, and utilization of facilities;
 - (4) The Financial Management and Comptrollership Service shall be responsible for providing the Commission with assistance on budgetary and financial matters and shall review accounting, budgetary and financial reports to determine conformity with set standards, examine financial operations, review its financial plan and expenditures program, and conduct cost reduction studies;

- 2 PNP plans and programs and shall formulate policies and procedures regarding acquisition, inventory, control, distribution, maintenance and disposal of PNP supplies. It shall oversee the implementation of PNP programs on transportation facilities and installations and the procurement and maintenance of supplies and equipment;

 10 of the Commission; draft or study contracts affecting the

| 6 | SEC. 14. Organization of the Philippine National |

Police. — The PNP shall be headed by a Chief who shall be assisted by two (2) Deputy Chiefs, one for operations and another for administration.

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10 The PNP shall have three (3) service branches as 11 follows: Police Service, Fire Protection Service, and Jail 12 Management and Penology Service. An Assistant Chief for 13 Police Service, an Assistant Chief for Fire Protection Service and an Assistant Chief for Jail Management and 14 Penology shall have staff supervision over each of the three 15 16 (3) service branches. Appointment of members in the three 17 (3) service branches shall be governed by specific qualifica-18 tions of each branch. Funds allocated for each service branch 19 shall be managed separately.

The PNP shall be composed of a national office, regional offices, provincial offices, district and municipal stations for police, fire and jail services.

At the national level, the PNP shall maintain its office in Metro Manila which shall house the directorial staff, service staff and special support units.

SEC. 15. Powers and Functions of the Chief of the Philippine National Police. — The Chief of the PNP shall exercise command over all the elements thereof subject to existing laws and policies and regulations that the Commission may promulgate.

SEC. 16. Manning Level. — On the average nationwide, the manning level of the PNP shall be approximately in accordance with a police-to-population ratio of one (1) policeman for every five hundred (500) population. The actual strength by cities and municipalities shall depend on the state of peace and order, population density and actual demands of the service in the particular area: Provided, That the minimum police-to-population ratio shall not be

The Chief of the PNP shall prescribe the table of organization and the grade distribution of the PNP based on its overall authorized strength, subject to the approval of the Commission.

SEC. 18. Key Positions. — The head of the PNP with the rank of Director General shall have the position title of Chief of the PNP. The second in command of the PNP with the rank of Deputy Director General shall be the Deputy Chief of the PNP for administration. The third in command with the rank of Deputy Director General shall be the Deputy Chief of the PNP for operations. The heads of the three (3) major service branches, with the rank of Director shall have the following position titles: Assistant Chief for Police Service, Assistant Chief for Fire Protection Service and Assistant Chief for Jail Management and Penology.

The heads of the regional offices with the rank of Chief Superintendent shall assume the position title of Regional Director; heads of the NCR district commands with the rank of Chief Superintendent shall have the position title of District Superintendent; the heads of the provincial offices with the rank of Senior Superintendent shall be known as Provincial Superintendent; heads of the district offices with the rank of Superintendent shall have the position title of District Superintendent, and heads of the munici-

pality or city with the rank of Chief Inspector shall be known as Chief of Police.

At the national office, the head of the directorial staff with the rank of Director shall be known as Chief of the directorial staff of the PNP; the heads of the various staff units in the directorial staff shall have the rank of Chief Superintendent with the position title of Assistant Chief of the directorial staff of their respective functional units.

SEC. 19. General Qualifications for Appointment. — Except for the qualified and eligible members of the erstwile PC-INP including the members of the technical services of the AFP assigned or detailed with the PC units, no person shall be appointed as officer or member of the PNP unless he possesses the following minimum qualifications:

- (1) He must be a citizen of the Philippines;
- (2) He must be a person of good moral conduct;
- (3) He must be of sound mind and body;
- (4) He must have at least completed high school for appointment to the lowest rank: *Provided*, That those to be appointed in metropolitan stations of the PNP must have finished at least second year college;
- (5) He must be eligible in accordance with the standards set by the Commission;
- (6) He must not have been dishonorably discharged

| (7) He must not have been convicted by final judg |
| ment of an offense or crime involving moral turpitude |
| (8) He must be at least one meter and sixty-two |
| centimeters in height for male and one meter and fifty |

| twenty-one (21) nor more than thirty (30) years of age. |
| SEC. 20. Appointment of PNP Officers and Members. — |
| The appointment of the officers and members of the PNP |
| shall be effected in the following manner: |
| (a) Patrolman/Jailguard/Fireman to Senior Sergeant |
| - appointed by the PNP Regional Director as recommended |
| by the city/municipal mayor in his capacity as the Chairman |
| of the Peace and Order Council and attested by the Regional |
| Director of the Commission; |
| (b) Inspector to Superintendent - appointed by the |
| Chief of the PNP, as recommended by their immediate |
| superiors and municipal/city mayor in their capacity as |
| Chairman of their respective Peace and Order Council at- |
| tested by the Commission; |
| (c) Senior Superintendent to Deputy Director-General |
| - appointed by the President upon recommendation by the |
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Chief of the PNP, and proper endorsement by the Chairman

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of the Commission.

The appointment of Senior Superintendent to Deputy
Director General shall be with the consent of the Commission on Appointments.

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Subject to the confirmation by the Commission on Appointments, the President shall appoint the Director General from among the senior officers down to the rank of Chief Superintendent in the service: *Provided*, That the Chief of the PNP shall serve a tour of duty not to exceed four (4) years: *Provided*, *further*, That, in times of war or other national emergency declared by Congress, the President may extend such tour of duty.

The appointments of civilian but non-police personnel of the PNP as well as employees of the Commission shall be subject to Civil Service rules and regulations.

SEC. 21. Lateral Entry of Officers Into the Philippine National Police. — In general, all original appointment of officers in the PNP shall commence in the grade of Inspector to include all those with highly technical qualification applying for the PNP technical services such as nurses, penologists, engineers, and graduates of forensic sciences, doctors of medicine, dentistry, optometry, lawyers, and chaplains shall be appointed in the grade of Senior Inspector in their particular technical service. Graduates of the Philippine National Police Academy (PNPA) and licensed criminologists shall be appointed in the initial grade of Inspector.

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- (a) Enforce all laws and ordinances relative to the protection of lives and properties;
- (b) Maintain peace and order and take all necessary steps to ensure public safety;
- (c) Investigate and prevent crimes, effect the arrest of criminal offenders, bring offenders to justice and assist in their prosecution so that the ends of justice may be served; and
- (d) Perform such other duties and exercise all other functions as may be provided by law and assigned to it by the Chief of the PNP in order to carry out the powers and duties of the Service.
- SEC. 25. Head. The head of the Police Service with the rank of Director shall be appointed as the Assistant Chief of Police Service and shall be responsible for the overall technical staff supervision over all elements of the branch. He shall have the power to issue detailed implementing policies and instructions regarding crime prevention measures, maintenance of peace and order, personnel, funds, properties, records management, correspondence and such other matters as may be necessary to effectively carry out the duties and functions of the Service.

SEC. 30. Narcotics Unit. — Headed by a Director with the rank of Chief Superintendent, the Narcotics Unit shall enforce all laws relative to the protection of the citizens against dangerous and other prohibited drugs.

SEC. 31. Aviation Security Unit. — Headed by a Director with the rank of Chief Superintendent, the Aviation Security Unit shall secure all the country's airports against offensive and terroristic acts that threaten civil aviation, exercise operational control and supervision over all agencies involved in airport security operation and enforce all laws and regulations relative to air protection and safety.

SEC. 32. Crime Laboratory. — (a) Central Crime Laboratory — Headed by a Director with the rank of Chief Superintendent, the Central Crime Laboratory shall be responsible in providing scientific and technical investigative aid and support to the PNP and other government investigative agencies which may avail of its services.

It shall likewise provide crime laboratory examination,

Powers and Duties of the National Fire Protection Service. - The National Fire Protection Service 8 shall have the following powers and duties: 9 10 (a) Implement and enforce the Fire Code of the 11 Philippines, the Philippine Electrical Code, and such other laws and city/municipal ordinances on fire protection and 12 13 safety, including the operation of ambulance and rescue 14 services: 15 (b) Act as principal assistant of the Chief of the PNP 16 and adviser of the Commission on all matters pertaining to fire protection and safety: 17 (c) Formulate and execute fire safety programs, 18. investigate all causes of fires and, if criminally caused, re-19 commend criminal prosecution to the proper prosecutor; and 20 (d) Perform such other powers and functions as may 21 22 be provided by law or as directed by the Chief of the PNP. SEC. 37. Head of the National Fire Protection Service. 23

- The head of the National Fire Protection Service with

the rank of Chief Superintendent shall be appointed as

SEC. 41. Composition. - The branch for Jail Manage-

- 3 logy Service as constituted under Presidential Decree No.
- 4 765 and all other qualified persons as described in this
- 5 Act. This branch shall be responsible for the detention
- 6 and rehabilitation of arrested criminal offenders.
- 7 SEC. 42. Powers and Duties of the Jail Management
- 8 and Penology Service. The Jail Management and Penology
- 9 Service shall exercise the following powers and duties:
- (a) Implement and administer all laws, policies,
- 191 rules and regulations and city/municipal ordinances on the
- detention and rehabilitation of prisoners;
- (b) Act as principal assistant to the Chief of the
- 194 PNP and adviser to the Commission on all matters pertaining
- to detention and rehabilitation of prisoners;
- 16 (c) Perform such other functions and duties as may
- 17 be provided by law or as may be directed by the Chief of
- 18 the PNP to effectively carry out the powers and duties
- of the Service.
- 20 SEC. 43. Head of the Jail Management and Penology
- 21 Service. The head of the Jail Management and Penology
- 22 Service with the rank of Chief Superintendent shall be ap-
- 23 pointed as the Assistant Chief for Jail Management and
- 24 Penology and shall have technical staff supervision over
- 25 all elements of the Service. He shall have the power to issue

- detailed implementing policies and instructions regarding detention and rehabilitation, personnel, funds, properties, records management, correspondence and such other matters as may be necessary to effectively carry out the powers and
- as may be necessary to effectively carry out the powers and duties of the Service.
- SEC. 44. Field Operating Units. At the regional and lower levels, jail management and penology shall be within the responsibility of the PNP Regional Director through the Jail Warden.

- SEC. 45. Establishment of Municipal/City Jail. There shall be established and maintained in every city and municipality a secured, clean, adequately equipped and sanitary jail for the custody and safekeeping of city and municipal prisoners, any fugitive from justice, or person detained awaiting investigation or trial and/or transfer to the provincial jail or national penitentiary, and/or violent mentally ill person who endangers himself or the safety of others, duly certified as such by the proper medical or health officer, pending his transfer to a mental institution.
- The Municipal/City Jail Service shall preferably be headed by a qualified and highly competent psychologist, psychiatrist or sociologist and shall assist in the immediate rehabilitation of individuals on detention. In the treatment and rehabilitation of detention prisoners, great care must be had so that the human rights of these prisoners are res-

pected and protected and that their health and physical
conditions are properly and promptly attended to.

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 CHAPTER III

PROFESSIONALISM, WELFARE AND BENEFITS

SEC. 46. Education and Training. — Education and training is an inherent command responsibility which shall be emphasized and adequately supported by resources. Only those who are highly qualified by virtue of academic preparations and proven professional competence shall be assigned as instructors to PNP colleges, schools and training units. The highest academic and training standards shall be set for all education and training institutions of the PNP.

SEC. 47. Performance Rating System. — There shall be established a performance evaluation system which shall be administered in accordance with the rules, regulations and standards, and a code of conduct promulgated by the Commission for members of the PNP. Such performance evaluation system shall be administered in such a way as to continually foster the improvement of individual efficiency and behavioral discipline as well as the promotion of organizational effectiveness and respect for the constitutional and human rights of citizens, democratic principles and ideals and the supremacy of civilian authority over the military.

The rating period as contemplated herein shall be based on standards prescribed by the Commission and shall consider the results of an annual physical and psychological and/or neuropsychiatric examinations conducted on the PNP officer or member concerned.

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SEC. 48. Promotions. — (a) A member of the PNP shall not be eligible for promotion to a higher position or rank unless he has successfully passed the corresponding promotional examination given by the Commission, the bar or the corresponding board examination for technical services and other professions, or has satisfactorily completed an appropriate and accredited course in the PNPA or equivalent training institutions. In addition, no member of the PNP shall be eligible for promotion unless he has been cleared of complaints preferred against him, if any, by the city or municipal Peace and Order Council.

- (b) Special promotion may be extended to any member of the PNP for acts of conspicuous courage and gallantry at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty, or for having been recommended as outstanding peace officer by the Peace and Order Council or selected as such in a nationwide search conducted by the PNP or any accredited civic organization.
- 24 SEC. 49. *Incentive and Awards*. There shall be 25 established an incentive and awards system which shall

be administered by a board under such rules, regulations
 and standards as may be promulgated by the Commission:
 Provided, That equivalent awards shall be given by the
 PNP for every award duly given by reputable civic orga-

nizations in a nationwide selection for outstanding achieve-

6 ment and/or performance to any member.

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SEC. 50. Health and Welfare. — It shall be the concern of the PNP to provide leadership and assistance in developing health and welfare programs for its members.

The Chief of the PNP shall take all proper steps towards the creation of an atmosphere conducive to a good supervisor-subordinate relationship and the improvement of personnel morale.

SEC. 51. Longevity Pay and Medical Allowance. — Members of the PNP shall be entitled to a longevity pay of ten percent (10%) of their basic monthly salaries for every five (5) years of continuous and satisfactory service compounded every five (5) years, which shall be reckoned from the date of the member's original appointment in the AFP, or appointment in the police, fire, jail or other allied services prior to integration of the PC and INP: Provided, That it shall not exceed fifty percent (50%) of the basic salary. They shall also be entitled to such monthly medical allowance for service rendered as may be prescribed by the Commission.

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SEC. 52. Complaints and Grievances. — Members of the PNP shall have the right to present complaints and grievances to their superiors or commanders and have them heard and adjudicated as expeditiously as possible in the best interest of the service with due regard to due process in every case. Such complaints or grievances shall be resolved at the lowest possible level in the unit of command and the respondent shall have the right to appeal from an adverse decision to higher authorities.

SEC. 53. Compulsory Retirement. - Compulsory retirement shall be upon completion of thirty-two (32) years of satisfactory active service for police uniformed personnel who have not advanced higher than the permanent rank of Superintendent for officers and the permanent rank of Sergeant for nonofficers: Provided, That officers promoted to the permanent rank of Senior Superintendent within the thirty-two (32) years of active service shall enjoy two (2) additional years of further service and two (2) additional years of active service for each succeeding promotion to the next higher permanent grade earned within the authorized period: Provided, further, That nonofficers who have attained the rank of Senior Sergeant within the thirty-two (32) years of active service shall be allowed to serve until his compulsory retirement: Provided, furthermore, That no officer and nonofficer shall serve beyond his sixtieth

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SEC. 58. Active Service. - For purposes of this Act, active service of the police personnel shall refer to active service rendered as an officer and nonofficer, cadet, probationary officer, trainee or draftee in the PNP or in the municipal police, fire or other allied services prior to the integration or in the INP or in the AFP and services rendered as a civilian official or employee in the Philippine Government prior to the date of separation or retirement from the PNP: Provided. That for purposes of retirement, he shall have rendered at least ten (10) years of active service as officer or nonofficer in the AFP, and/or in the INP and/ or the PNP: Provided, further, That services rendered as cadet, probationary officer, trainee or draftee in the AFP or as cadet or trainee in the INP and PNP shall be credited for purposes of longevity pay and, Provided, finally, That for cadet service, the maximum number of service to be credited shall not exceed the duration of the pre-commissionship course specified in the curriculum.

SEC. 59. Death and Disability Benefits. - A PNP

member and/or his heirs shall be entitled to all benefits 1 relative to the death or permanent incapacity of a PNP 2 3

member as provided for under existing laws and/or other

laws relative thereto. 4

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SEC. 60. Exemption from Attachment and Taxes. All benefits granted by this Act shall not be subject to attachment, levy, execution or any tax of whatever nature, including benefits received or to be received from the Govemment Service Insurance System.

10 Members of the Philippine National Police SEC. 61. Missing in Action. - Any officer or uniformed member 11 of the PNP who, while in the performance of duty or by 12 reason of his being an officer or member of the PNP, is 13 officially confirmed missing in action, kidnapped or cap-14 tured by lawless elements, shall, while so absent be entitled 15 to receive or to have credited to his account the same pay 16 and allowances to which such officer or uniformed member 17 was entitled at the time of the incident: Provided, That 18 such officer or uniformed member shall not have been 19 instead absent from duty without authority: Provided, 20 further. That the compulsory retirement of a person missing 21 in action shall be processed to allow the members of the next 22 of kin to enjoy the retirement benefits: Provided, finally, 23 That should the Chief of the PNP, upon the recommen-24 dation of the proper authority and/or immediate super-25

visor, subsequently determine that the officer or uniformed 1 member concerned has been absent from duty without 2 authority, such member or his heirs shall reimburse the 3 PNP all such amounts and allowances received by him in 4 5 accordance with this section. SEC. 62. Payment of Portion of Salary and Allowances 6 7 to Heirs of Members. - In case any officer or uniformed member of the PNP has been officially confirmed as missing 8 in action under any of the circumstances provided in the 9 preceding section, the Chief of the PNP shall direct payment 10 11 of the absent officer's or uniformed member's salary and allowances and other emoluments pertinent thereto to be 12 paid to his/her heirs for their support for a period of eighteen 13 (18) months from the date of commencement of absence. 14 15 SEC. 63. Finding of Death and the Termination of 16 Payment of Salary and Allowances. - Upon the termination 17 of the eighteen-month period as specified in the preceding 18 section, the missing officer or member of the PNP shall be 19 automatically terminated. In the event said officer or mem-20 ber of the PNP shall thereafter be found to have been living and is not entitled to the benefits paid under Sections 61, 21 62 and 63 of this Act, said benefits shall be reimbursed 22 to the State within six (6) months from his reappearance. 23 However, if his continued disappearance was fraudulent 24

or made in bad faith, he shall also, together with his coconspirator, be prosecuted according to law.

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CHAPTER IV

DISCIPLINARY MACHINERY

- SEC. 64. (a) Disciplinary Powers of Supervisors and Equivalent Officers. The duly designated supervisors and equivalent officers of the PNP shall, in dealing with all offenses as hereinafter defined under Section 72 found to have been committed by any regular member of their respective commands, after due notice and hearing where such member was given the opportunity to defend himself, exercise disciplinary powers as follows:

The disciplinary action imposed upon a member of the PNP shall be final and executory: Provided, That a disciplinary action imposed by a supervisor lower than the Chief of the PNP or equivalent agency head may be appealed within ten (10) days from receipt thereof to the next higher supervisor who shall decide the case within ten (10) days from receipt of the notice of appeal: Provided, further, That the disciplinary action imposed by the Chief of the PNP may be appealed to the Commission within ten (10) days from receipt thereof and the Commission or its Regional Appellate Board,

Preventive Suspension Pending Criminal 21 Case. - Upon the filing of a complaint or information 22 sufficient in form and substance against a member of the 23 PNP, the court shall immediately suspend the accused from

SEC. 69. Entitlement to Reinstatement and Salary. -A member of the PNP who may have been suspended from office in accordance with the preceding paragraphs or who shall have been terminated or separated from office shall, upon acquittal from the charges against him, be entitled to prompt payment of salary, allowances and other benefits withheld from him by reason of such suspension and to reinstatement ipso facto without prejudice to the compul-sory retirement age.

SEC. 70. Legal Assistance. — The Secretary of the Department of Justice, the Chairman of the Commission or the Chief of the PNP may authorize lawyers of their respective agencies to provide legal assistance to any member of the PNP who is facing before the fiscal's office, the court or any administrative body a charge or charges arising from any incident which is related to the performance of his official duty: Provided, That government lawyers so authorized shall have the power to administer oaths: Provided, further, That in any case the member facing the charge shall be entitled to engage a private legal counsel of his choice: Provided, finally, That the Secretary of Justice, the Chairman of the Commission and the Chief of the PNP shall jointly promulgate rules and regulations to implement the provisions of this section.

 15 Chairman pursuant to Executive Order No. 309, as amended,
 16 develop and establish an integrated area/community public
- 17 safety plan embracing priorities of action and program
- 18 thrusts for implementation by the local PNP stations.

1 and summary hearings, disciplinary penalties for minor offenses committed by members of the PNP assigned to 2 3 their respective jurisdictions through admonition or rep-4 rimand; restriction to specified limits; withholding of privi-5 leges; forfeiture of salary for not more than thirty (30) days; suspension for not more than thirty (30) days; or 6 7 any combination of the foregoing: Provided, That a deci-8 sion of the mayor imposing a penalty of forfeiture of pay 9 or suspension for sixteen (16) but not more than thirty 10 (30) days shall be appealable to the Regional Appellate Board 11 of the Commission within ten (10) days from receipt by 12 respondent of a copy of the decision on such disciplinary 13 action, whose decision on the appeal shall be final and 14 executory.

A minor offense shall refer to an act or omission not involving moral turpitude, but affecting the internal discipline of the PNP.

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- (d) In addition to the aforementioned powers, city and municipal mayors shall have the following authority over the PNP units in their respective jurisdiction:
- 21 (1) Authority to recommend reassignment or detail 22 of PNP members outside of their respective cities or towns 23 or residence;
 - (2) Authority to recommend from the list of eligibles previously screened by the Peace and Order Council the

- plementation of this Act shall be systematically undertaken in three (3) phases.
- 3 SEC. 76. Phases of Implementation. The implementation of this Act shall be undertaken in three (3) phases, to wit:

Phase I — Exercise of option by the uniformed members 6 of the Philippine Constabulary, the PC elements assigned 7 or detailed with the Narcotics Command, CIS, and the 8 personnel of the technical services of the AFP assigned 9 with the PC to include the regular CIS investigating agents 10 and the operatives and agents of the NAPOLCOM Inspec-11 tion, Investigation and Intelligence Branch, to be comple-12 ted within six (6) months from the date of the effectivity 13 of this Act. At the end of this phase, all personnel from the 14 INP. PC. AFP Technical Services and NAPOLCOM Ins-15 pection, Investigation and Intelligence Branch shall have 16 been covered by Official Orders assigning them to the PNP 17 18 by their respective units.

Phase II — Approval of the Table of Organization and Equipment of the PNP, preparation and filling up of its staffing pattern, transfer of assets to the PNP and reorganization of the Commission, to be completed within twelve (12) months from the effectivity date hereof. At the end of this phase, all personnel to be absorbed by the PNP shall have been issued appointment papers in PNP, and the

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1 reorganized Commission and the PNP shall be fully operational. The PC officers and enlisted personnel who have not 2 opted to join the PNP shall be reassigned to the Army, Navy 3 or Air Force or shall be allowed to retire under existing 4 AFP regulations. 5 Phase III - Adjustment of ranks and establishment 6 of one (1) linear roster of officers and another for non-7 8 officers; rationalization of compensation and retirement systems taking into consideration the existing compensa-9 tion schemes and retirement and separation benefit systems 10 of the different components of the PNP to ensure that no 11 12 member of the PNP shall suffer any diminution in basic longevity and incentive pays, allowances and retirement 13 benefits due them before the creation of the PNP, to be 14 completed within eighteen (18) months from the effecti-15 16 vity of this Act. To accomplish the tasks of Phase III, the 17 Commission shall create a Board of Officers composed of 18 the following: NAPOLCOM Commissioner as Chairman and one (1) representative each from the PC, INP, Civil 19 Service Commission, Department of Budget and Manage-20 21 ment, and Department of Justice as members. Upon the effectivity of this Act, the Commission 22 shall exercise administrative supervision as well as opera-23 tional control over the transferred, merged and/or absorbed 24 AFP and INP units. 25

SEC. 77. Transitory Provisions. — To effectively carry out the objectives and purposes of this Act, the following transitory provisions are hereby prescribed:

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(a) The transfer, merger and/or absorption of any government office/unit shall include the functions, appropriations, funds, records, equipment, facilities, choses in action, rights, other assets, and liabilities, if any, of the transferred office/unit as well as the personnel thereof, as may be necessary, who shall, in a hold-over capacity, continue to perform their respective duties and responsibilities and receive their corresponding salaries and benefits. Those personnel of the transferred, merged and/or absorbed office/ unit whose positions are not included in the new position structure and staffing pattern approved by the Commission or who are not reappointed shall be given preference to join the PNP or shall be allowed to retire under existing laws, rules and regulations. Otherwise, they shall be deemed separated and paid gratuity equivalent to one (1) month basic salary for every year of service or fraction thereof. (b) Upon approval of this Act, the officers and employees of the Commission and the absorbed/merged offices/ units shall, in a hold-over capacity, continue to perform their respective duties and responsibilities and receive their corresponding salaries and benefits unless in the meantime they are separated in accordance with existing laws.

The Commission shall approve and prescribe its new staffing pattern and prescribe the authorized positions created thereunder. The same shall be filled with regular appointment by the Chairman of the Commission or the President, as the case may be. Those incumbents whose positions are not included therein or who are not reappointed or who are not appointed in the PNP shall be deemed separated from the service. Those separated from the service shall have the benefits provided for separated personnel in the immediately preceding provisions hereof.

(c) The Chief of the PNP shall, within six (6) months from the effectivity of this Act, recommend the organization structure and staffing pattern of the PNP to the Commission for approval by the President.

CHAPTER VII

COMMON PROVISIONS

SEC. 78. Funding. — The appropriations of the abolished, transferred or reconstituted offices for the current fiscal year shall be transferred to the Commission and the PNP to carry out the provisions of this Act. Thereafter, suchamounts as are needed shall be included in the annual General Appropriations Act.

SEC. 79. Implementing Authority. — The Commission shall issue rules, regulations and directives necessary to ensure the efficient, expeditious and effective implementation of the provisions of this Act.

| 1 | SEC. 80. Separability. — Any portion or provision |
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| 2 | of this Act that may be declared unconstitutional shall |
| 3 | not have the effect of nullifying other portions or provisions |
| 4 | thereof so long as such remaining portions or provisions |
| 5 | can still subsist and be given effect in their entirety. |

SEC. 81. Repealing Clause. — All laws, decrees, ordinances, provisions of city charters, and rules and regulations and other issuances or parts thereof which are inconsistent with this Act are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.

11 SEC. 82. Effectivity. — This Act shall take effect upon 12 its approval.
