

INTRODUCED BY SENATOR MANNY VILLAR

RESOLUTION

URGING THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON LABOR, EMPLOYMENT AND HUMAN RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY, IN AID OF LEGISLATION, INTO THE PLIGHT OF OVERSEAS FILIPINO WORKERS VIS-À-VIS THE RAMPANT HUMAN TRAFFICKING WITH THE END IN VIEW OF STRENGTHENING THE LAWS THEREOF

WHEREAS, the Constitution under Section 3 of Article XIII provides that The State shall afford full protection to labor, local and overseas, organized and unorganized, and promote full employment and equality of employment opportunities for all;

WHEREAS, Filipino workers have become susceptible to human trafficking to find employment overseas;

WHEREAS, according to the 2010 Report on Trafficking in Persons by the U.S. State Department, the Philippines is a destination and transit country for men, women, and children who are subjected to trafficking in persons, specifically forced prostitution and forced labor;

WHEREAS, it also reported that a significant number of Filipino men and women who migrate abroad for work are subjected to conditions of involuntary servitude worldwide;

WHEREAS, trafficked Filipino migrant workers were often subject to violence, threats, inhumane living conditions, non-payment of salaries, and withholding of travel and identity documents;

WHEREAS, trafficked men, women, and children were found in factories, construction sites, and employed as domestic workers in Asia and increasingly throughout the Middle East;

WHEREAS, likewise, human trafficking of Filipinos to impoverished nations like Haiti is also significantly increasing;

WHEREAS, the Blas Ople Policy Center reported that some Filipino workers were deployed by a second agency, and not by the original agency that accepted their job applications. In other instances, the trafficked victims were received by labor suppliers pretending to be legitimate foreign employers;

WHEREAS, there is a need to strengthen the regulatory powers of the Philippine Overseas Employment Administration as well as the need to review the provisions of the Anti-Human Trafficking Act;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate of the Philippines to urge the Senate Committees on Labor, Employment to conduct an inquiry, in aid of legislation, into the plight of overseas Filipino workers vis-à-vis the rampant human trafficking with the end in view of strengthening the laws thereof.
