A RESOLUTION

DIRECTING THE APPROPRIATE SENATE COMMITTEE TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY, IN AID OF LEGISLATION, ON THE ALLEGED LARGE-SCALE SCAM IN THE PROCUREMENT OF INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS RESULTING TO A SINGLE PROPRIETOR, C.T. LEONCIO CONSTRUCTION AND TRADING, GARNERING BILLIONS OF PESOS WORTH OF PROJECTS SINCE 2011

WHEREAS, Republic Act No. 9184 ("R.A. 9184") entitled "An
Act Providing for the Modernization, Standardization and Regulation of
the Procurement Activities of the Government and for Other Purposes,"
otherwise known as the "Government Procurement Reform Act"
("GPRA") was enacted on January 10, 2003, and took effect on January
26, 2003;

7 WHEREAS, the GPRA was enacted to improve competition, 8 transparency, accountability, efficiency and economy in the procurement 9 activities of all procuring entities of government through the institution 10 of streamlined and standardized procurement rules and procedures. It 11 also holds public officials found guilty of corruption, coercion, collusion and disruptive practices liable for administrative, criminal and civil
 sanctions;

WHEREAS, public procurement is essential to ensure high and sustainable economic growth. When done well, it results in the awarding of contracts to companies which deliver maximum value to the public, and improves the level of wellbeing for society as a whole. However, public procurement has always been highlighted as a high risk area for corruption, where government processes are prone to manipulation to the advantage of influential individuals for personal gain¹;

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11 WHEREAS, House Majority Floor Leader Rolando Andaya Jr. during his privilege speech in the House of Representatives on 12 December 10, 2018, and during the hearing of the House Committee on 13 Rules on January 3, 2019, revealed a large-scale scam on the 14 15 implementation of the 2018 budget, in which a certain single proprietor, 16 C.T. Leoncio, allegedly garnered billions of pesos in contracts in various congressional districts. In Sorsogon alone in 2018, C.T. Leoncio 17 allegedly cornered 39 public works projects, yet it has failed to complete 18 some of them; 19

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WHEREAS, based on the data of Philippine Government 21 Electronic Procurement System (PhilGEPS), 333 government contracts 22 were awarded to C.T. Leoncio from April 2011 to April 2018. The 23 contracts have a total worth of P12.94 billion. Two hundred seventy-five 24 (275) of these contracts, with a total worth of P9.24 billion, were entered 25 into by the government with C.T. Leoncio alone. The remaining 58, 26 worth a total of P3.7 billion, were projects of C.T. Leoncio in joint 27 28 venture with other contractors. Three hundred twelve (312) of these contracts, worth a total of P12.35 billion, were implemented by the 29 different regional, provincial, and district offices of the Department of 30 Public Works and Highways²; 31

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33 WHEREAS, similar instances have been reported where certain 34 contractors would bag several government infrastructure contracts worth

billions of pesos, such as Katha Builders and Supplies, which allegedly
cornered 49 contracts worth more than P1.6 billion by September 30,
2018; and R.C. Tagala Construction (now registered as Syndtite
Construction Corp.), which had bagged PhP5.7 billion worth of
contracts in 2016 but was later on blacklisted by DPWH in August of
2018.

WHEREAS, Rep. Andaya questioned how a small construction 8 outfit like C.T. Leoncio was able to bag multi-billion peso contracts in 9 provinces located hundreds of kilometers away from its office in Sta. 10 Maria, Bulacan. He said that based on their study, C.T. Leoncio has 11 already incurred negative slippages in different projects of the 12 government, which only shows its lack of competence. He even pointed 13 out that some of the committed equipment units by C.T. Leoncio for use 14 in one project are also committed to be used in other on-going projects at 15 the same time. Lastly, he alleged that C.T. Leoncio is also being used as 16 a dummy by Aremar Construction, to bag government projects. He said 17 that C.T. Leoncio's role, being a 'triple A' construction company, is just 18 to secure the contract and then lend its license to the company that will 19 20 really undertake the project;

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WHEREAS, monitoring reports submitted by Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) district offices in the provinces, where C.T. Leoncio has projects since 2017, would show that it has incurred delays. Of the 39 infrastructure projects awarded to C.T. Leoncio in 2018, 7 were not implemented according to the project timetable. As of September 2018, project slippages had ranged from 19 percent to 50 percent³;

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WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 34.3 of the Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) of R.A. 9184, during the post-qualification process, the Bids and Awards Committee is supposed to verify, validate, and ascertain all statements made and documents submitted by the bidder, ensuring its compliance with the legal, technical, and financial requirements specified in the rules and the bidding documents;

WHEREAS, the aforementioned facts put into question not just the procurement processes of DPWH, awarding contracts to a favored and pre-determined contractor, who is of doubtful capacity to undertake several projects, and who is already in delay; but also the whole procurement process as provided in R.A. 9184 and its IRR, whether it has enough safeguards in place to prevent favored and incapacitated contractors to bag government contracts;

10 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** as it is hereby 11 resolved to direct the appropriate Senate committee to conduct an 12 inquiry, in aid of legislation, into the procurement processes of these 13 infrastructure projects by the DPWH, with the end in view of making 14 changes to our procurement laws and processes, if found necessary.
