AN ACT BANNING AND PROHIBITING THE USE, PURCHASE AND STORAGE OF ELEMENTAL MERCURY IN ALL PUBLIC AND PRIVATE SCHOOLS AND OTHER EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

- SECTION 1. Short Title. This Act shall be known as the "Safe Schools Mercury Reduction Act of 2009".
 - SEC. 2. Declaration of Policy. It shall be the policy of the State to protect its citizens from the effects of toxic chemical substances that present unreasonable risk and/or injury to health or the environment by prohibiting the use, purchase and storage of mercury and mercury instruments in all public and private schools and other educational institutions.
 - SEC. 3. Elimination of the Use of Elemental Mercury. Except as otherwise provided in this section, no public or private school or educational institution in the country shall purchase, use or store any quantity of free flowing elemental mercury for any purpose, nor purchase, use or store any instrument which contains mercury including, but not limited to, thermometers,

barometers, sphygmomanometers and manometers. If no reasonably acceptable mercury-free alternative exists for any instrument prohibited under this Act, a school or educational institution may use such type of instrument as long as it contains the lowest mercury content readily available in the market.

SEC. 4. *Penalties*. — Any person or entity who shall violate any provision of this Act shall, upon conviction, be meted the penalty of not less than five (5) years of imprisonment or a fine of not less than One hundred thousand pesos (P100,000.00) but not more than One million pesos (P1,000,000.00) or both such imprisonment and fine, at the discretion of the court, if the violation resulted to injury to health.

In case of death, the penalties imposable under the Revised Penal Code shall be imposed upon the violators.

SEC. 5. Implementing Rules and Regulations. — The Secretary of the Department of Health, in consultation with the Department of Environment and Natural Resources, the Department of Education and the Commission on Higher Education, shall issue and promulgate the rules and regulations needed to implement the provisions of this Act which shall require public and private schools and other educational institutions in the country to dispose of or recycle any quantity of elemental mercury and instruments containing mercury in a manner which is least harmful to the environment and in accordance with prescribed international standards. The said agencies shall compile, produce and distribute to all public and private schools and other educational institutions in the country, materials explaining the hazards associated with the exposure to elemental mercury and the actions that may be taken to reduce such hazards.

SEC. 6. Separability Clause. – If, for any reason, any part of or provision of this Act is declared unconstitutional, such parts not affected thereby shall remain in full force and effect.

SEC. 7. Repealing Clause. — An	y law, executive order, letter of
instruction, rule and regulation, circular	, issuance or any part thereof
inconsistent with any of the provisions of thi	is Act is hereby repealed, modified
or amended accordingly.	

5 SEC. 8. Effectivity. - This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after 6 its publication in the Official Gazette or in any newspaper of general 7 circulation.
