AN ACT DECLARING THE MAYON VOLCANO NATURAL PARK IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBAY AS A PROTECTED AREA AND PROVIDING FOR ITS MANAGEMENT

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

ARTICLE I

TITLE, POLICIES, OBJECTIVES, AND JURISDICTION

- 1 SECTION 1. Short Title. - This Act shall be known as the "Mayon 2 Volcano Natural Park (MVNP) Act". 3 SEC. 2. Declaration of Policy. – It is hereby declared the policy of the 4 State to ensure the protection and conservation of the Mayon Volcano as a protected area in order to preserve its biological diversity, the uniqueness of its 6 landscape and its sociocultural and economic significance to the people of the 7 Province of Albay. 8 SEC. 3. Definition of Terms. - As used in this Act: 9
 - (a) Bioprospecting refers to the research, collection and utilization of biological and genetic resources for the purpose of applying the knowledge derived therefrom for commercial and academic purposes;

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- (b) Buffer zones refer to the identified areas outside the boundaries of and immediately adjacent to the MVNP pursuant to Section 7 hereof that needs special development control in order to avoid or minimize harm to the natural park;
- (c) By-products or derivatives refer to any part or substance extracted from wildlife, in raw or in processed form. These include stuffed animals and herbarium specimens;
- (d) Collection or collecting refers to the act of gathering or harvesting wildlife, its by-products or derivatives;
- (e) Exploitation refers to any mode of use, extraction, development,
 utilization or disposition of resources, for whatever purpose whether commercial or otherwise;
- (f) Exotic species refers to the species or subspecies that do not naturally occur within the MVNP at present or in historical time. It shall include the Genetically Modified Organisms (GMOs);
- (g) Free and Prior Informed Consent (FPIC) refers to the consensus of all members of the MVNP Management Board/Indigenous Cultural Communities (ICCs)/Indigenous Peoples (IPs) to be determined in accordance with their customary laws and practices, free from any external manipulation, interference and coercion and obtained after fully disclosing the intent and scope of an activity, in a language and process understandable to the community;
- (h) General Management Plan refers to the basic long-term framework plan in the management of the protected area that shall serve as guide in the preparation of the annual plan and budget;
- (i) General Management Planning Strategy refers to the guide in the formulation of the site-specific management plans, including buffer zones; and
- (j) Littering refers to the disposal of small amounts of nonbiodegradable solid waste materials such as cigarette butts, candy wrappers, plastic bags, bottles, and glasses in the MVNP which cause or contribute to the deterioration of the resources or habitats in the MVNP.

The administration of the MVNP shall be vested with the PAMB. In addition to the powers and functions as enumerated in the National Integrated Protected Areas System or the NIPAS Act of 1992, the PAMB shall:

(1) Impose and collect resource user's fees and provide for its

- disposition;
- (2) Designate collecting officers for funds generated for the MVNP and formulate procedures for the management and disbursement thereof;
- (3) Recommend the appointment of the Protected Area Superintendent (PASu) to the RD of DENR Region V based on internal selection criteria;
- (4) Exact fines and fees for violations of this Act, guidelines, rules and regulations within the MVNP;
- (5) Promulgate its procedural rules, which shall include discipline and removal of its officers and members:
- (6) Provide the necessary mechanisms to ensure the harmonization, complementation, consultation and participatory decision-making processes among the various stakeholders;
- (7) Enter into any contract or agreement concerning the MVNP as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this Act; and
- (8) Perform such other functions necessary for the fulfillment of the provisions of this Act and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations.

The PAMB shall coordinate with the DENR regarding the confiscation of materials or resources from the MVNP, which shall be disposed of in accordance with the guidelines of the DENR. A report on this matter shall be regularly rendered by the concerned officer of the DENR and the PASu to the PAMB. The proceeds of the disposition of these materials or resources shall accrue to the PAMB Trust Fund.

SEC. 6. Jurisdiction Over the MVNP. – The overall authority and jurisdiction over the MVNP shall be exercised by the PAMB. This jurisdiction and authority shall be exercised in harmony with the powers, rights and authorities of the local government units (LGUs) having territorial jurisdiction

over the MVNP: *Provided, however*, That in the issues of protection and conservation, the authority of the PAMB shall take precedence. The DENR RD shall oversee the performance of the PAMB.

SEC. 7. MVNP Buffer Zone. – The PAMB may identify and recommend the establishment of a buffer zone, in consultation with the MVNP stakeholders.

The buffer zone shall be a component of the MVNP under the jurisdiction of the PAMB. Specific management prescription and land use management options shall be provided by the PAMB for the buffer zone. Such prescription and land use options shall be incorporated in the General Management Plan (GMP) and the LGU's Comprehensive Land Use Plans (CLUPs).

ARTICLE II

MANAGEMENT AND INSTITUTIONAL MECHANISMS

SEC. 8. Term of Office of PAMB Members. – The Secretary of the DENR shall appoint the members of the PAMB. Except for local government officials, members of the PAMB shall serve for a term of five (5) years: Provided, That the member remains connected with the sector represented.

The PAMB shall issue the necessary guidelines for the selection and qualification of its members, and replacement process in case a vacancy occurs. The PAMB members shall not receive any compensation but shall be entitled to reasonable *per diem* in accordance with existing accounting, budgeting and auditing rules and regulations.

SEC. 9. Protected Area Superintendent (PASu). – There is hereby appointed a Protected Area Superintendent as the chief operating DENR officer of the MVNP. The PASu shall be supported by the existing personnel of the DENR and shall be directly accountable to the PAMB and to the RD of DENR Region V. The PASu shall, however, provide necessary coordinative mechanisms to the Community Environment and Natural Resources Office (CENRO) and the Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Office

1 (PENRO). The PASu shall have full responsibility to the protection of land,
2 water, wildlife and other resources within the MVNP. Pursuant thereto, the
3 PASu shall have the following duties and responsibilities in addition to those
4 under existing laws and regulations:

- (a) Prepare the management plan and its subsequent plans as herein provided;
- (b) Serve as secretariat to the PAMB with the duty to provide the PAMB with all the information necessary to make appropriate decisions for the implementation of this Act;
- (c) Recommend the hiring of the necessary personnel to support the operations of the MVNP subject to the availability of funds;
- (d) Develop and implement park information, education and visitor programs;
- (e) Enforce the laws, rules and regulations and PAMB resolutions relevant to the protected area and its buffer zones, and assist in the prosecution of offenses. Monitor all the activities within the MVNP and its buffer zones in conformity with the management plan; and
 - (f) Perform such other functions as the PAMB may assign.

SEC. 10. The General Management Plan (GMP). — There shall be a MVNP General Management Plan. The GMP shall articulate the overall strategic direction for the protection and management of the MVNP. It shall also include all site-specific management strategies and activity targets for all management zones and for other sectoral concerns of the MVNP. The GMP shall be prepared by the PASu in close collaboration with the PAMB and other stakeholders of the MVNP. The GMP shall cover a period of applicability for twenty-five (25) years, subject to periodic review every five (5) years or as the need arises. The GMP shall be reviewed and approved by the PAMB. The GMP shall also be presented to all the LGUs within the MVNP and shall be integrated in their specific CLUPs and Municipal Development Plans (MDPs).

The GMP shall conform to all national environmental programs of the government, and shall be affirmed by the DENR Secretary.

SEC. 11. The Role of Local Government Units and Local Communities. – The Provincial Government of Albay and the cities of Tabaco, Legazpi and Ligao and the municipalities of Malilipot, Sto. Domingo, Daraga, Camalig and Guinobatan, with stakeholders in the MVNP, are hereby recognized as partners in the protection and management of the MVNP. As such, they shall participate in the management of the MVNP through the PAMB. The provisions of this Act shall be incorporated into the municipal/city and provincial plans as part of their environmental concerns and shall ensure that local ordinances pertaining to environment are consistent with this Act and the GMP, as herein provided.

The LGUs shall also allocate not less than three percent (3%) of their local development fund to finance the conservation and development activities in the MVNP protected area, within the framework of the GMP and approved by the PAMB.

SEC. 12. MVNP Fund. — There is hereby established a trust fund to be known as the MVNP Fund for purposes of financing projects of the MVNP. All income generated from the operation and management of the MVNP shall accrue to the MVNP Fund. These income shall be derived from fees from permitted sale and export of flora and fauna and other resources from the protected area; proceeds from lease of multiple-use areas; contributions from industries and facilities directly benefiting from the protected area; and such other fees and income derived from the operation of the protected area.

The MVNP Fund may be augmented by grants, donations, and endowment from various sources, domestic or foreign.

The PAMB of the MVNP shall retain seventy-five percent (75%) of all revenues raised, to be deposited in any government bank within the locality: *Provided*, That disbursements out of such deposits shall be made solely for the protection, maintenance, administration and management of the area and the

implementation of duly approved projects endorsed by the PAMB in accordance with existing accounting, budgeting and auditing rules and regulations: *Provided*, *further*, That the MVNP Fund shall not be used to cover personal services expenditures.

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The remaining twenty-five percent (25%) of the revenues shall be deposited as a special account in the National Treasury as share in the Integrated Protected Area Fund (IPAF) created pursuant to Republic Act No. 7586.

The concerned LGUs shall continue to impose and collect all other fees not enumerated herein but which they have traditionally collected, such as business permits, property tax, and rental of LGU facilities. Furthermore, LGUs may charge fees in addition to those imposed by the PAMB: *Provided*, That such additional fees shall be determined based on the contribution of the LGUs in the maintenance and protection of the protected area.

SEC. 13. Tax Exemption. – Any grant, bequest, endowment, donation and contribution made to the MVNP to be used actually, directly and exclusively by the MVNP shall be exempt from donor's tax and the same shall be considered as allowable deduction from the gross income of the donor, in accordance with the provisions of the National Internal Revenue Code of 1997, as amended.

ARTICLE III

UTILIZATION OF RESOURCES

SEC. 14. Resource Use. — No person or entity shall enter, enjoy or utilize any portion of the MVNP and the resources therein for whatever purpose without prior permission from the PAMB or the PASu as herein provided. Tenured migrants, if there are any, may be allowed to cultivate, harvest and utilize resources in the designated multiple-use zone, buffer zones and in other allowable zones as may be indicated in the GMP.

Bioprospecting and other biodiversity-related researches shall be allowed only to PAMB-accredited research institutions. Stricter procedures in the conduct of such academic and commercial research activities shall be issued by the PAMB within six (6) months from the effectivity of this Act.

The derivation and utilization of resources within the MVNP shall be governed by the PAMB and shall be allowed only for the purpose of maintaining the ecological balance and integrity of the MVNP.

SEC. 15. Utilization Permits and User's Fees. – The PAMB shall have the exclusive power to issue permits and impose its conditions or impose and collect fees for the derivation and utilization of resources within the MVNP: Provided, That the PAMB may delegate to the PASu the authority to issue permits and to collect fees for temporary access to the MVNP, such as passage and visiting, subject to the limits as may be provided by the PAMB: Provided, however, That entry into the MVNP for emergency reasons shall not be subject to entrance fees or user's fees.

SEC. 16. Water User's Fees. — A water user's fee shall be collected from any water user where water is used for any of the following purposes: domestic use, industrial or commercial use, irrigation, recreation, or power generation in an amount to be determined by the PAMB after due consultation with the LGUs within the MVNP.

The PAMB shall formulate the necessary rules and regulations for the effective implementation of this section.

SEC. 17. Energy and Nonrenewable Resources. – Any exploration, exploitation or utilization of nonrenewable resources, such as minerals and fossil fuel such as oil, coal and natural gas within the MVNP shall not be allowed. Except from sun and wind sources, energy projects shall be allowed only through an Act of Congress.

SEC. 18. Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA). – Any development activity within the MVNP, being an Environmentally Critical Area (ECA), shall be subjected to the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) system pursuant to Presidential Decree No. 1586. The PAMB shall determine the developmental activities that would require an Environmental Compliance Certificate (ECC) in consultation with the concerned agency.

1 ARTICLE IV 2 TENURED MIGRANTS 3 SEC. 19. The Rights of the Tenured Migrants. - The rights of the 4 tenured migrants, if there be any, shall be covered by an appropriate tenurial 5 instrument issued by the DENR. Such instrument shall be issued to organized 6 tenured migrant communities. 7 ARTICLE V 8 PROHIBITED ACTS AND PENALTIES SEC. 20. Prohibited Acts and Penalties. - The following are the 9 10 prohibited acts and their corresponding penalties: 11 (a) Hunting, collecting, catching, gathering, capturing, wounding, 12 killing, destroying, or possessing within the MVNP or its buffer zones species 13 of plants and animals or their by-products or derivatives, or transporting of 14 these plants and animal species without prior approval of the PAMB. 15 The offender shall be penalized with a fine of not less than five thousand pesos (P5,000.00) but not more than five hundred thousand pesos 16 17 (P500,000.00) and imprisonment of not less than six (6) years and one (1) day 18 but not more than twelve (12) years and forfeiture of all resources, equipment 19 and conveyances used for violating this section. The PAMB shall also impose 20 an administrative fine based on the market value of the resources, plus 21 ten (10) times the market value of the resources as environmental damages. 22 and forfeiture of all resources, equipment and conveyances used for violating 23 this section: 24 (b) Bioprospecting without obtaining prior PAMB clearance and FPIC. 25 and the appropriate DENR permit. Penalty shall be six (6) months and one (1) 26 day to six (6) years of imprisonment, and a fine of two hundred thousand pesos 27 (P200,000.00) to one million pesos (P1,000,000.00) and forfeiture of the 28 resources subject of the offense, together with the equipment and conveyance 29 used. The PAMB shall also impose an administrative fine of five hundred 30 thousand pesos (P500,000.00) to two million pesos (P2,000,000.00) and

forfeiture of all resources, equipment and conveyances used for violating this

section. Violation of the terms and conditions of any existing permits granted to institutions or individuals shall constitute the commission of this offense. In addition to the penalties herein provided, any permit granted to the offender shall be automatically cancelled;

- (c) Acts of vandalism such as mutilating, transporting, destroying, excavating or in any manner damaging any natural formation or object of natural beauty inside the MVNP, including the removal, destruction and alteration of boundary markers and signs. Fine of not less than twenty-five thousand pesos (P25,000.00) but not more than five hundred thousand pesos (P500,000.00) or imprisonment of not less than six (6) months and one (1) day but not more than six (6) years and the restoration and rehabilitation of the damaged area. The PAMB shall also separately impose on the offender, a fine equivalent to the value of rehabilitating or restoring the damaged area;
- (d) Burning, clearing or kaingin within the MVNP or its buffer zones. Judicial fine of not less than ten (10) times the value of the burned or cleared areas and imprisonment of one (1) year and one (1) day but not more than six (6) years. The PAMB shall also separately impose on the offender, an administrative fine equivalent to the value of rehabilitating or restoring the damaged area;
- (e) Unreasonable disturbance of wildlife and other habitats, reproductive cycles, roosting and feeding grounds and migratory paths. Judicial fines and penalties shall be in accordance with the provision of the Wildlife Act. The PAMB shall also impose an administrative fine of not less than ten thousand pesos (P10,000.00) but not more than fifty thousand pesos (P50,000.00);
- (f) Exploration, exploitation or extracting, drilling, or prospecting for mineral resources, treasure hunting, or quarrying within the MVNP or its buffer zones. Judicial fine of not less than five hundred thousand pesos (P500,000.00) but not more than five million pesos (P5,000,000.00) and/or imprisonment of not less than six (6) months and one (1) day but not more than six (6) years, and the restoration and rehabilitation of the damaged area,

together with the confiscation of equipment, tools, vehicles and resources. The PAMB shall also separately impose on the offender, a fine equivalent to the value of rehabilitating or restoring the damaged area;

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- (g) Possession or use of chainsaw, power saw and other motorized equipment anywhere within the MVNP or its buffer zones without prior permit from the PAMB. Imprisonment of six (6) years and one (1) day to eight (8) years or a fine of thirty thousand pesos (P30,000.00) to fifty thousand pesos (P50,000.00) shall be imposed on the offender in violation of this section. The PAMB shall also confiscate the chainsaw, power saw and other motorized equipment;
- (h) Introduction of exotic species within the MVNP. Fine of not less than five thousand pesos (P5,000.00) but not more than five hundred thousand pesos (P500,000.00) and/or imprisonment of not less than six (6) months and one (1) day but not more than six (6) years. The PAMB shall also confiscate the exotic species of flora and fauna. Should the court or the PAMB determine that these species are detrimental to the integrity of the MVNP, they shall order the appropriate disposition of the same;
- (i) Construction or maintaining any kind of road, edifice, or any kind of enclosure, structure, facility or any infrastructure project, or operating business enterprise within the MVNP without prior permit from the PAMB. Fine of not less than five hundred thousand pesos (P500,000.00) but not more than five million pesos (P5,000,000.00) and/or imprisonment of not less than six (6) months and one (1) day but not more than six (6) years, and demolition of the improvements which may be detrimental to the integrity of the MVNP shall be imposed. The court shall forfeit in favor of the PAMB all improvements, equipment and conveyances used in violation of this section;
- (j) Unauthorized entry except in emergency situations. The PAMB shall impose an administrative fine of one thousand pesos (P1,000.00) to thirty thousand pesos (P30,000.00) as herein provided;
- (k) Unauthorized occupation or cultivation of areas without PAMB permit. The PAMB shall impose an administrative fine of ten thousand pesos

(P10,000.00) to seven hundred thousand pesos (P700,000.00) together with the forfeiture of all improvements, which may be detrimental to the integrity of the MVNP; and

- (I) Dumping of waste and littering within the MVNP and its buffer zones. Dumping of waste shall be punishable by imprisonment of six (6) months and one (1) day but not more than six (6) years and a fine of five thousand pesos (P5,000.00) to two hundred fifty thousand pesos (P250,000.00). The violator shall also be ordered to clean up the waste and pay for the cleanup thereof.
- (m) Violation of rules and regulations provided in the GMP or resolutions approved by the PAMB. An administrative fine of not less than five thousand pesos (P5,000.00) but not more than fifty thousand pesos (P50,000.00) shall be imposed.

In all the abovementioned acts, should the offender be an association or corporation, the officers thereof shall be directly responsible for the act of the employees of the association or corporation and shall suffer the corresponding fines and penalties as herein provided. An offender who is not a citizen of the Philippines shall be immediately deported to their country of origin after serving sentence and upon payment of all criminal and administrative fines. For cases involving foreigners, no plea-bargaining shall be allowed without the concurrence of the PAMB, the DENR and any such person who has initiated the filing of the case as complainant.

SEC. 21. Fines and Forfeitures. – All criminal fines and forfeitures that may be imposed by the courts, and the administrative fines and forfeitures that may be imposed by the PAMB under this Act, shall be given to the PAMB and shall form part of the funds and assets of the MVNP.

ARTICLE VI

LAW ENFORCEMENT AND PROSECUTION

SEC. 22. Law Enforcement. – The DENR shall implement the provisions of this Act and shall have the power to call upon other agencies for assistance. The DENR, upon the recommendation of the PAMB, shall

deputize any group or persons to enforce the provisions of this Act. Such
 deputization shall be in writing and signed by the DENR Secretary or the RD
 to be valid and effective.

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SEC. 23. Inspection Powers. — The PASu and law enforcers shall have the power to stop, board, search and inspect all vehicles and conveyances within the MVNP for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this Act, other laws, rules and regulations. The PASu and other authorized law enforcers may enter premises or areas subject of a lease, permit or concession from the PAMB or DENR for monitoring of compliance with environmental laws, rules and regulations. Any hindrance made to these inspections shall be considered a violation of these rules and shall subject the offender to the immediate closure of the enterprise pending full inspection as may be warranted.

SEC. 24. Special Prosecutors and Counsels. — The Department of Justice (DOJ), upon the recommendation of the PAMB, shall designate a special prosecutor, from among state and public prosecutors to do the preliminary investigation and prosecute violations of this Act, other laws, rules and regulations within the MVNP. The special prosecutor shall coordinate with the PAMB and PASu in the performance of duties and assist in the training of forest rangers in arrest and criminal procedures. The PAMB shall periodically submit an evaluation of the performance of the designated special prosecutor to the DOJ.

The PAMB may retain the services of a competent lawyer to prosecute and assist in the prosecution of cases under the direct control or supervision of the special prosecutor and to defend the members of the PAMB and PASu or persons assisting in the protection, conservation and development of the MVNP against any legal action related to the powers, functions and responsibilities as provided in this Act or as delegated by the PAMB.

SEC. 25. Citizen's Suit. – For purposes of enforcing the provisions of this Act or its implementing rules and regulations (IRR), any citizen may file an appropriate civil, criminal or administrative action in the proper courts/bodies against:

- (a) Any person who violates or fails to comply with the provisions of this Act or its IRR;
- (b) Any person who is mandated to implement and enforce the provisions of this Act with respect to orders, rules and regulations issued inconsistent with this Act; and
- (c) Any public officer who willfully or grossly neglects the performance of an act specifically enjoined as a duty by this Act or IRR, or abuses one's authority in the performance of this duty or in any manner improperly performs the duties under this Act or its IRR: *Provided, however,* That no suit can be filed until after thirty (30) days notice has been given to the public officer and the alleged violator concerned and no appropriate action has been taken thereon.

The court shall exempt such action from the payment of filing fees, and statements; likewise, upon *prima facie* showing of the non-enforcement or violation complained of exempt the plaintiff from filing an injunction bond for the issuance of preliminary injunctions. In the event that the citizen's suit should prevail, the court shall award reasonable attorney's fees, moral damages and litigation costs to the plaintiff.

SEC. 26. Suits and Strategic Legal Action against Public Participation (SSLAPP) and the Enforcement of this Act. — Where a suit is brought against a person who has filed the appropriate case, criminal or administrative as provided in Sections 25 and 26 of this Act, against any person, institution or government agency implementing this Act, it shall be the duty of the investigating prosecutor or the court, as the case may be, to make a determination within a period of thirty (30) days whether said legal action has been filed to harass, vex, exert undue pressure or stifle such legal resource of the person complained of in enforcing the provisions of this Act. Upon

1 determination thereof, evidence warranting the same, the investigating 2 prosecutor or the court, as the case may be, shall dismiss the complaint. 3 Further, the person who has brought the suit to harass, vex. exert undue 4 pressure or stifle such legal recourse in the case of public officers who are 5 sued for acts committed in their official capacity, there being no grave abuse 6 of authority, and done in the course of enforcing this Act, shall be liable for 7 the payment of attorney's fees and damages in favor of the respondent. 8 ARTICLE VII 9 TRANSITORY PROVISIONS SEC.27. Selection and Appointment of the New Protected Area 10 11 Management Board Members-Representatives. - Prior to the effectivity of 12 this Act, the existing PAMB shall continue to exercise its powers and 13 functions until the new PAMB has been constituted in accordance with the 14 provisions of this Act. 15 Within one (1) month from the effectivity of this Act, the existing 16 PAMB shall draw up the guidelines in consultation with the agencies and 17 sectors to be represented in the new PAMB, for the selection of its 18 representatives. 19 Within three (3) months from the effectivity of this Act, the 20 members of the PAMB shall have been appointed by the Secretary of the 21 DENR. 22 ARTICLE VIII 23 GENERAL PROVISIONS 24 SEC. 28. Rules and Regulations. - The PAMB shall promulgate, 25 within six (6) months from the effectivity of this Act, the appropriate rules and 26 regulations. 27 SEC. 29. Appropriations. - The Secretary of the DENR shall include 28 in the Department's program the implementation of this Act, the funding of 29 which shall be included in the annual General Appropriations Act.

> SEC. 30. Construction and Suppletory Application of Existing Laws. The provisions of this Act shall be construed liberally in favor of achieving

1	biodiversity conservation, protection and sustainable development. The
2	provisions of the NIPAS Act of 1992, existing forestry and environmental
3	laws, and their corresponding rules and regulations not inconsistent hereto
4	shall have suppletory effect in the implementation of this Act.
5	SEC. 31. Separability Clause If any part or section of this Act is
6	declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, such declaration shall not affect
7	the other parts or sections hereof.
8	SEC. 32. Repealing Clause All laws, presidential decrees, executive
9	orders, rules and regulations inconsistent with this Act shall be deemed
10	repealed or modified accordingly.
11	SEC. 33. Effectivity This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after
12	its publication in the Official Gazette or in a newspaper of general circulation.
