AN ACT

INCREASING THE BED CAPACITY OF THE PHILIPPINE GENERAL HOSPITAL FROM ONE THOUSAND AND FIVE HUNDRED BEDS (1,500) TO TWO THOUSAND AND TWO HUNDRED BEDS (2,200) AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

Since the establishment of the Philippine General Hospital (PGH) in 1907 by virtue of Act No. 1688 passed by the Philippine Commission, it has served not only as a beacon of hope for Filipinos, particularly the marginalized, seeking professional medical attention but also as a training ground for some of the best and brightest medical students and professionals in the country. In fact, today, PGH is dubbed as the biggest modern government tertiary hospital in the Philippines and the only national referral center for tertiary care.

Since it caters to mostly indigent patients, hundreds of Filipinos flock to the hospital as it offers a wide range of services. As a result, PGH reports that it serves more than 600,000 patients yearly. And with limited bed capacity — 1,100 public beds and 400 private beds — PGH is constantly challenged to provide every patient the needed medical service and care.

For instance, in June 2022, the hospital reported that its emergency room capacity has already reached up to 200% due to patients with non-COVID-19 related issues such as pneumonia, diabetes, and heart, lung and kidney diseases. PGH Spokesperson Jonas del Rosario noted that the hospital's ER – which only has 70 beds – catered to around

150 patients. Consequently, every day is a constant struggle not only for the patients and their families but also for the health care workers – most of whom have sacrificed better paying positions in private hospitals in order to serve our most vulnerable. This could also prove detrimental especially during a pandemic since the lack of facilities may expose patients to the COVID-19 virus.

With these in mind, this measure aims to ease to the burden of PGH as it will allow them to expand their facilities in order to cater to more who seek medical attention. As the country's apex hospital dedicated to our poorest of the poor, the government should extend any and all possible support.

Given the abovementioned circumstances, approval of this bill is earnestly sought.

AN ACT

INCREASING THE BED CAPACITY OF THE PHILIPPINE GENERAL HOSPITAL FROM ONE THOUSAND AND FIVE HUNDRED BEDS (1,500) TO TWO THOUSAND AND TWO HUNDRED BEDS (2,200) AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

- **SECTION 1.** The authorized bed capacity of the Philippine General Hospital (PGH) is hereby increased from one thousand and five hundred (1,500) to two thousand and two hundred (2,200).
- **SEC. 2.** The existing hospital facilities and professional health care services of the PGH, shall be correspondingly upgraded to include the increase in the number of its medical personnel. The University of the Philippines (UP) shall promulgate the necessary rules and regulations for the effective implementation of this Act.
- **SEC. 3.** The increase in the bed capacity of the PGH from one thousand and five hundred beds (1,500) to two thousand and two hundred (2,200) beds shall be implemented within the period of six (6) months to one (1) year from the approval of this Act.
- **SEC. 4.** The University of the Philippines, through its approved annual budget, shall initially provide the necessary funding to support the increase in bed capacity of the PGH. The entire budgetary requirements of PGH for its operation and the upgrading of its facilities and services shall be included in the annual General Appropriations Act (GAA) the following year of its enactment.

- SEC. 5. This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in the
- 2 Official Gazette or in a national newspaper of general circulation.
